A Great Day in the Stoke is intended to inspire the Black community to feel welcome in the water and to experience and share the joy of surfing the waves safely as well as paying homage to veteran Black surfers who have been surfing since the 1950's . A Great Day in the Stoke welcomes all BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color communities and allies to surf in unity.



All Are We Water Collective works in partnership with Tribal and Indigenous communities on the West Coast and in Maui to co-create outdoor educational and recreational programs for families. These programs promote healthy lifestyles, uplift Native wisdom of the environment and inspire a sense of responsibility to protect our planet for future generations. We amplify indigeneity, diversify our surfing communities, and strengthen community relations between Indigenous Nations and the non-Native community members who live on their ancestral lands.

He went on to submit a letter to the editor of SURFER in hopes of finding fellow Black surfers who would be interested in connecting and surfing with him. SURFER published that letter in January 1974, which prompted a slew of responses. Chill has served more than 30,000 young people since the program began, working with more than 2,000 youth annually. We partner with social service agencies, mental health agencies, foster care programs, juvenile justice programs, and schools in local communities to engage youth participants. All gear and services necessary to enjoy boardsports are provided to the youth at no cost. Our programs recognize the inherent strength and potential present in each of our participants. Through boardsports, we teach new skills, build confidence, and inspire a lifelong love for boardsports.



Surfing engages youth with the natural world, boosts self-confidence, and improves social and emotional learning skills. We focus on youth who have not historically been represented in surf culture to work towards diversifying the line-up.
