Dimensions: Biennial Exhibition of California Fine Craft January 5 to February 18

The San Luis Obispo Museum of Art and the Central Coast Craftmakers are pleased to present *Dimensions*, a biennial exhibition of fine craft featuring artworks created from clay, fiber, glass, metal, paper, and wood by artists living in California. This always popular exhibition will be on view in the Museum's Gray Wing through mid-February.

This year's juror is Peggy Sivert Zask. Ms. Zask currently operates the Zask Gallery in Rancho Palos Verdes as well as serving as an important figure in the founding of South Bay Contemporary Art Museum. She was educated at CSU Long Beach and CSU Dominguez Hills. She has taught art at Mira Costa High School in Manhattan Beach and has exhibited her art throughout Los Angeles as well as across the nation. The artwork of Peggy Sivert Zask begins with traditional materials like clay, wood, metal or canvas. Strongly conscious of the environmental impact of consumption, she chooses to work with found objects or reworks existing artworks rather than starting with new materials.

Dimensions received over 130 artwork submissions, of which 51 where juried into the exhibition. This year's *Dimensions* features artwork by many artists never previously shown at the Museum, as well as 13 artist members of SLOMA with artwork in this exhibition. •

Aquarius 2018 February 23 to April 15

The Museum of Art is pleased to present Aquarius 2018, the annual exhibition of California watercolors organized by the Central Coast Watercolor Society. This year's juror, Michael Reardon, selected 40 paintings that display a wide range of watercolor techniques and subject matter. Along with the paintings juried into the exhibition, several paintings by Mr. Reardon will be on display. "Jurying an art exhibition is always a challenge, as was the case with Aquarius 2018. Narrowing an exhibition to forty pieces means that many worthy paintings cannot be selected. Nonetheless, it also means that those that are chosen demonstrate exceptional work... I believe these forty paintings form a very strong ensemble, showing some of the finest of what watercolor can offer." said Juror. Michael Reardon.

Alternative Viewpoints is an interactive, mixed media installation by Arroyo Grande artist Lori Wolf Grillias. In preparation for this exhibition, she has been collecting metal spoons at several locations in the community, which will be incorporated into her spoon sculptures. This exhibition grapples with a difficult subject: opioid addiction. Spoons are

Dreams For Sale: 30 Years of Movie Posters January 5 to January 28



The San Luis Obispo Museum of Art and the Central Coast Photographic Society present the artwork of Jeffrey Bacon, an artist behind many of the most iconic movie posters. "This exhibition is a trip down memory lane for movie fans, plus an educational component for those interested in the creative process and the inner working of the movie industry. Jeffrey has constructed 4x4 foot panels that will transform the Nybak Wing and he has created a timeline of images and a storyline in the McMeen Gallery that we know will delight our visitors," says SLOMA Curator Ruta Saliklis.

Jeffrey Bacon is an art director, graphic designer, and master craftsman whose career in movie poster design spanned three decades. His posters are more than an evocation of the films they were advertising. He was fortunate to work with some of the biggest names in Hollywood, including Steven Spielberg and fellow poster designer Drew Struzan, and to work on films such as *The Goonies, Back to the Future, Terminator 2: Judgment Day*, and *Gladiator.*
